I took this shot last May during a workshop in Oregon. Our last stop was at the Rogue River-Siskiyou National Forest, which is near the California border. The path to this waterfall was extremely narrow, and I constantly had to move my tripod to accommodate hikers. With each setup, I tried different angles and exposures of the waterfalls, and I settled on this one to submit.

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April Competition Assignment: Twilight/Night

To be eligible for this competition, photos must be taken in outdoor settings only, without use of studio or flash lighting. Twilight is the period after sunset and before sunrise when the atmosphere is partially illuminated by the sun (which is below the horizon and not visible). Night pictures are taken any time after sunset or before sunrise. Photos must be taken on or after April 1, 2021.



April 12 Twilight/Night EIC and Print Competition Judge: Clay Blackmore

His Rockville, Maryland, studio supports a team of passionate photographers and filmmakers working with the most cutting-edge technologies in the field.

In addition, he is active in ministry and his local community, and he volunteers his time to help others through photography.

April 26 Program: "How Photographs Produce Meaning" with Jenny Kuhla

Jenny Kuhla earned an M.F.A. in studio art from the School of the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston. She also has a B.A. in art history and a B.F.A. in studio art from Tufts University. After earning her master's degree, Jenny was an account executive and photo editor for a boutique New York City photo agency before becoming an instructor at the Savannah College of Art and Design.

This presentation will be a semiotic exploration of how photographs produce meaning and communicate information. Semiotics is the study of the ways in which signs (textual, linguistic, or visual) create meaning and the degree to which our personal and cultural baggage and inheritance influence our interpretations.

NBCC members planning to attend this program should first read a seminal essay by Roland Bathes, "The Rhetoric of the Image." A link to this essay will be sent in a Gordiegram in early April.

The program will start, as Barthes does in his essay, by exploring an advertising image of the Panzani brand of pasta, pasta sauce, and parmesan cheese that was marketed to French consumers in the 1960s. From there, Jenny will discuss concepts of personal idiolect (meaning coming from personal attributes and history), asyndeton (shortcuts to meaning), and, more broadly, sign systems.

March Nature Competition Intermediate Print Winners



1st Place Fairy Tale Forest [©] **Steven Frahm**

Perseverance and being open to the unexpected led to this image. It was taken during an early-morning hike around Berry Hill Pond in Gros Morne National Park, Newfoundland. The hike was mostly around the beautiful pond, but part of the trail was beside a patch of forest and ground cover. There was a natural pathway for the eye and interesting leaves for a foreground element. I worked the framing through several exposures to get this image. In postprocessing, I emphasized the pathway, foreground, and lush green of the ground cover.

2nd Place Slot Canyon © **Steven Lapidus**

This image was captured on the Antelope Canyon Indian Reservation, aka Slot Canyons. Tripods, monopods, and photo tours are no longer permitted in the canyons, so I took this image handheld in the somewhat dark caverns that were crowded with tourists. This was not the optimal environment. I captured this image with my Olympus OMD EM-1 Mark III. My exposure settings were ISO 3200, 1/60 sec, and f80.

The bird in this image is part of the story. The whales were bubble net feeding - diving and circling under a school of fish while blowing bubbles to concentrate them. They then shot up through the circle to devour the compressed school of fish. Since the whales were under water until the last moment, I didn't know where they would surface. But the birds knew and flew overhead looking for the big circle of bubbles. When the whales emerged, the birds dove into the feeding frenzy to pick up the scraps.

1st Place Zen of a Cicada Killer Wasp [©] **Bruce Cyr**

This was one of over a thousand shots I took of this subject. Although the image was blurry because of the subject's distance, the background benefited from more blurring in postprocessing. Wasps rarely waste a sting on a human being who respects their routines and never on me – yet! I used a Canon 100mm macro lens with a Canon EF Lifesize converter, a Sony 1.4 Teleconverter, a Metabones adapter, and a Sony A7R III camera at f16, ISO 1600, and 1/320 sec.

2nd Place Little Face **Bill Seelig**

I arrived at the National Zoo's Great Ape House as it opened one rainy day, so this little orangutan couldn't go out and play. I ended up entertaining him with my little hand-held LED, which had the added benefit of lighting up his face. What fun!





3rd Place Great Blue Heron & Catch of the Day [©]**Dick Pelroy**

The image was taken just outside of St. Petersburg, Florida, in tidal flats that are heavily populated by salt-water-wading birds. I caught a great blue heron just after it had caught a large fish. I used a 600mm prime lens at 1/2000sec and maximum aperture. The result is a good stopaction portrait of how this wading bird fishes in these fish-abundant shallow waters.

Last week, I was eating my breakfast in the dining room while looking out the window. I was enjoying the quiet and peaceful view of my backyard. Suddenly, a bird flew by the window and stopped on a tree. It was a downy woodpecker and was pecking for a bug. I thought, "Hurry up!" I took my camera with the 100-400mm tele lens and rushed to take this picture. I felt so lucky!

I took this image on a foggy morning last fall at Croydon Creek Nature Center in Rockville. The nature center is one of my favorite local photography spots in every season because it's lovely and very close to my home, and I've never seen another photographer there! I increased the saturation of some of the colors using the HSL/color panel in Lightroom because I wanted to reflect the feeling I got when I came to this lovely spot.

I spotted this rabbit at the North Mountain National Trail in North Mountain Park in Phoenix, Arizona, where I often hiked during my two months there. There was a short interpretive trail and garden with cacti and other plants, and probably a hidden hose under the bushes to water the plants in the desert heat. This thirsty rabbit was taking advantage of the little bit of water. I lightened the rabbit to separate it more from its surroundings.

The shape of this heron, facing me head on with a fish, reminded me of a cross—an iconic symbol that often has a powerful impact. The capture was difficult to process. The bird's right wing was clipped off, and its right side was overexposed. In Photoshop, I used multiply mode to darken it and balanced the exposure. I also used the clone tool to add detail to some blown-out areas in the neck. Finally, I cropped the image to keep the viewer's attention on the bird's head and the fish.

3rd Place Blue Dasher Dragonfly [©] Bennett Fletcher

I was inspired to visit Lake Artemesia (near College Park) by my neighbor, who had seen a variety of dragonfly species there. I have several photos of the slaty skimmers and blue dashers that are common in this area, but I wanted to capture some different species and try a new teleconverter for my favorite macro lens. My best capture of the day was this juvenile blue dasher dragonfly. Taken at f36, the capture was sharp enough to crop to emphasize the eyes and thorax.

1st Place Asparagus Beetle in a Lotus [©] **David Terao**

I took this image at Kenilworth Aquatic Gardens last summer when the lotuses were starting to bloom. I was captivated by the intense colors and patterns of the lotus pods when I saw this beetle inside one pod. The dark beetle added a nice contrast to the lotus pod. However, getting a good angle was a little difficult because the tall lotus was growing in swampy water. I used a tripod to position the camera above the lotus pod while looking through the camera's dim, electronic rear screen. I took several shots.

On the western coast of Alaska, the Chugach Mountains offer majestic peaks seemingly almost within reach. The Glenn Highway runs from Glennallen to Anchorage, along glaciers, mountains, and streams. Perhaps not as well known as Denali and the Alaska range, the Chugach Mountains are every bit as beautiful.

This was shot at a canyon creek in the South Island of New Zealand. As I waded deep into the canyon, I was intrigued by the lone backlit fern growing way up on the canyon wall and a small waterfall trickling down from another wall behind. I compressed the scene with a long lens and placed the two subjects in juxtaposition nicely. In postprocessing, I dodged and gave a hint of the shapes of the dark canyon walls and the silky splash bounced from the rock.
